

MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL - IGCSE UPDATES (YEAR 11)

I trust this continues to find everyone safe and well.

As we are aware CAIE made the announcement featured in my email on the 26th of March, that the physical examinations for the June 2020 series for IGCSE *will not run* and that students will still receive a grade and certificate based on their predicted grades. These results will be released in the usual timeframe of early August 2020.

Following some detailed conversations, there is a four-step process we are following here at the school. I am working closely with our subject teachers, Heads of Department and or Examinations Officer to establish the most accurate grade based on robust evidence, teacher judgements and Cambridge Grade Descriptors.



The examination board has made it very clear to all schools that this differs from a target or forecast grade where we would submit a 'best performance possible' grade. The predicted grade together with rank orders is part of this new process. Predicted grades will stem from a school's judgement about each candidate, and combine all the evidence a school wants to consider, including any forecast grades we have previously submitted to the Cambridge examination board.

The predicted grade should be the grade that, in the professional opinion of the teacher, the candidate would have been most likely to achieve if the June 2020 exam series had taken place.

As my correspondence on the 1st of April 2020 also indicated: -

The types of evidence that might be available could include but will not be limited to:

- mock exams
- coursework (complete or incomplete)
- assignments

They also advise us that:-

You do not need to set students fresh work to gather evidence – for example, you do not need to set new mock papers, set assignments or ask them to complete unfinished coursework.

Finally, all schools are advised not to share these predicted grades with students or parents as the step four standardisation process may lead grades to either:-

- Move to receive a higher grade
- Remain at the same grade; or
- Move to receive a lower grade

We are heavily involved in this process at the moment, comparing our historical data of student past performances from the start of the IGCSE course, termly assessments, teacher assignments and mock examinations.

Please note that our mock examinations completed in January 2020 were used as a performance indicator and we would expect student performance to potentially rise if the students have focused and followed the raising achievement plans teachers are utilising. I am pleased to report that many students have indeed done this and raised their focus since the mock examinations.

We are due to submit all predicted grades to CAIE by the end of May 2020.
